PASTOR ANTHONY'S RIPPLES

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

A couple months ago, I asked the Parish Council to think back to their earliest memory of Holy Communion. What is your earliest memory of Holy Communion? Mine is going early to church with my dad to watch him fill the communion cups with a little squirt bottle. I did not receive Holy Communion until my confirmation day. And I never knew at that age why this was so important, but I did know that it was something special.

So then I asked the Parish Council another question and I ask you this question, "What does Holy Communion mean to you? Why is it important to you?" Many of the answers that I heard were, "It is a Holy Meal." "I am receiving the forgiveness of my sins." "It spiritually nourishes me." If you are thinking along the same lines, then I wonder what is so special about the first and the last Sundays of the month. What makes



these particular Sundays more special than the rest of them? Going all the way back to the Early Church, it is a common understanding that every Sunday we celebrate Easter, the Resurrection of Our Lord. And as Carl writes in his article this month, we do *celebrate* not only the Resurrection of Our Lord every Sunday, but we also *celebrate* Holy Communion. This is a celebration, a Holy Meal, a time where heaven and earth come together, and an opportunity for us all to physically receive and inwardly digest the forgiveness of our sins.

For the whole month of August, we will be **celebrating** Holy Communion at all of our worship services, each week. Week after week in August, in the Gospel readings from John, Jesus continually refers to himself as the Bread of Life. The Bread of Life that nourishes us, feeds us, forgives us, and saves us. So it is most fitting for us during these coming weeks to **celebrate** with all of the saints who have gone before us and **celebrate** with all of our fellow members of the Body of Christ.

Come, join us in August as we celebrate the grace that God has given

us through simple, everyday items like bread and wine. The picture of the chalice, wheat and grapes is a stained glass window in Trinity's sanctuary. Come to the banquet, that foretaste of the feast to come.

Parish Council Meeting Minutes - July 14, 2015

Meeting was called to order at St. Peter Lutheran at 6:20 pm by President Steve Williamson.. Other members present: Merle Burmeister, Marilyn Cheever, Jody Franck, Karen Helvig, Deb Philipp, Kirsten Rabbe, Jon Saxen. Staff present: Pastor Anthony Christoffels. Congregational Presidents present: Nancy Nordstrom from Waverly, Jody Franck from St. Peter.

Motion by Jon Saxen, seconded by Karen Helvig, to approve the agenda as amended. (August meeting, Pulpit Supply) Motion passed.

Pr. Anthony led us in devotions. If your church building were destroyed in a tornado, would we still have a congregation? If it were destroyed by a tornado, would your community notice anything different? A thought provoking discussion was held over how we make a difference, what the community needs, how we minister to those around us, how the bad in life brings out the best in us as a church, but that we need to make a difference in good times and in bad. Pr. Anthony closed with the last 2 verses of Matthew's Gospel: the Great Commission.

The Secretary's report for the June 10, 2015 Parish Council meeting was presented. Motion by Jon Saxen, seconded by Deb Philipp, to approve the Secretary's report as amended. Motion passed.

Jon Saxen presented the June 2015 Operating Statement to the Parish Council. Year-to-date budget discussion followed. Motion by Merle Burmeister, seconded by Jody Franck, to approve the Treasurer's report as presented. Motion passed.

REPORTS

Pastor Anthony Christoffels report

. Mission on the Prairie – good turn out! Over 50 at each session. One more excellent speaker coming up August 12th. St. Peter will be providing the food.

. Flat Jesus pictures keep coming in.

. Summer Parish worship and picnic – July 26th in Ceylon at the City Park (2 blocks east of St. Peter). Dessert (a cake) is provided, also beverages, utensils, plates, cups. Rain location: St. Peter.

. August 25-26th – Pr. Anthony at Continuing Ed in the Cities.

Wedding/Funeral Committee

Policies have been reviewed. Changes have been made. Committee members from each congregation are proofreading, and will report back to Pr. Anthony. The church councils will have them in August, then the Parish Council will address in September. Pr. Anthony will send copies to the Congregational and Parish Councils for review before their meetings. All Councils will have chance to make modifications. Pastor Anthony and the committee wanted congregations to have first look, as weddings and funerals happen in their individual churches, so they need the greatest level of input.

OLD BUSINESS

Insurance

Given a significant recent price increase on insurance for one of our congregations, Circle of Faith will begin work on getting bids for insurance for all three congregations together. Approval would have to be obtained by all Congregational Councils and the Parish Council. Jon Saxen and Jon Helvig will work with congregational presidents and treasurers on this project

NEW BUSINESS

God's Work, Our Hands Sunday – Backpack Program

Beginning on God's Work, Our Hands Sunday, Circle of Faith will be supporting the Backpack program for Martin County West, Truman, and Fairmont school children who don't get enough to eat at home on weekends. This program, supported by churches throughout the area and administered by Greta Lintelman of Heaven's Table, sends home a bag of food (2 breakfasts, 2 hot meals, 4 snacks) in a brown bag, tucked in the student's backpack, every weekend. The students who will receive these are those in grades K-6 who qualify for free lunches through the school district. Heaven's Table can purchase the necessary food at a greatly reduced cost over what individuals can purchase it for, so it makes sense for them to purchase and package the food. The schools themselves will get the bags discretely into the students' backpacks before they leave on Friday. The responsibility of the participating churches would be to raise money to support the program. Cost likely of \$3.00/student/ weekend (bag) of food. Final number of children participating will be determined in late August, after schools know how many qualify. Currently all three Circle of Faith congregations, Partners in Ministry in Trimont (First Lutheran and United Methodist), and St. John's in Sherburn will be participating, along with churches in Fairmont and Truman. Greta Lintelman asked our input on whether to run separate accounts for each of the three districts participating, or just one account for all of Martin County. Circle of Faith's Parish Council felt that one account was adequate – we have kids in all three districts. "Just feed the kids" was the common theme of our discussion.

Each congregation will come up with their own fundraising effort, and we will give our gifts to Heaven's Table for this program.

Pulpit Supply list discussion - how to evaluate and update the list as we move forward.

The next Parish Council meeting will not be a business meeting, but a brainstorming session as we move into the new year. It will be held Tuesday, August 11, 2015, 6:00 pm, at Helvig's cabin.

Motion by Kirsten Rabbe, seconded by Deb Phillip, to adjourn at 8:05 pm.

A Seminarian's Letters Home

August 2015

To the membership of Circle of Faith Parish:

Greetings to you all from Evanston, IL! By the time you read this, we'll be well into the weeks when the lectionary treats us to a bunch of long discourses from John's Gospel. For basically the next month, we'll hear Jesus talking about bread week after week. During that time, Circle of Faith will also be celebrating Holy Communion every Sunday. I am so excited that this is happening! If I wanted to be funny, I'd say that we are doing this because we'll all be so hungry, having heard all this stuff about bread. But that's not the only reason why.

One of the promises Jesus made to his followers in John's Gospel was "where I am, there you will be also." Throughout our history, Christians have expressed that promise in our art and our music, right up to today. At Waverly, there was a time when the altar rail was in the shape of a half-circle, disappearing into the wall. At Trinity, angel statues flank the altar for the same reason. At St. Peter, also, that's why so many saints' symbols appear in the stained-glass windows in the sanctuary. Moreover, this is why we always sing the angels' hymn – "Holy, Holy, Holy Lord, God of power and might..." every time we have Communion. All of these things are meant to show our belief that everyone who has gone before us, all the angels and saints, are there with us, with Christ in the center, every time we celebrate Holy Communion. They are there - we just can't see them. Heaven and earth come together at the table we call the Eucharist. That's why we call what we do *celebrating* Holy Communion. Sounds like a pretty good thing to celebrate, too! So, let's enjoy these weeks of feasting with the Bread of Life, and with those who dine at heaven's banquet beyond our sight.

Enjoying these weeks of the feast Christ gave us, let us pray for God's blessing, using these words:

Life-giving God, in the mystery of Christ's resurrection you send light to conquer darkness, water to give new life, and the bread of life to nourish your people. Send us forth as witnesses to your Son's resurrection, that we may show your glory to all the world, through Jesus Christ our risen Lord. Amen. [ELW, Prayer after Communion]

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.


Jeremy reminded me to look into LED light through Federated.

As I write this we have had 2 of our July breakfasts with about 80 attending each time. It is great that so many come to have a good coffee and fellowship and the donations help the churches with their mission projects.

Janice and I attended the 28th Annual Convention of the SW MN Synodical organization of the WELCA. There were 168 in attendance. Interesting speakers, Bible studies, workshops and music made for a great 2 days. A total of 3,296 quilts; 1,156 personal care kits; 50 fabric kits and 544 baby care kits were collected. We delivered 20 quilts, 13 personal care, 8 fabric and 5 baby care and a large box of Christian literature.

We will furnish the meal for the August 12th "Mission on the Prairie" presentation. These are great theology series and I urge more to attend.

The annual Okoboji Bible camp quilt auction will be held Saturday, August 1st. Viewing from 9:30—11 am., lunch and the auction starts at 1 pm. There are always about 150 beautiful quilts and new this year will be a silent auction on Hardanger pieces. The Ingham camp will have the annual Hog Roast on August 23rd.

Muriel reports a treasury balance of \$1,878. including the 2 breakfasts. \$100. was given each to the Malaria Fund, Relay for Life, Alex Schmidt family who are going to Germany for 2 years to the Black Forest Academy, a school for the Children of our missionaries, to the food packet drive held at Gustavus Adolphus where 110,000 food packets were prepared for SW MN.

The WELCA convention ended with "snacks to go" based on I Peter 4:10 — "Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received."



Discussion continued related to helping individuals for that Sunday. Suggestions were referred to the Caring Ministries Committee.

Harvest Homecoming Report: Nancy reported the Committee was meeting that evening to begin plans for the event on September 20th.

Parades: It was reported there was a good turn out from all 3 congregations for the Trimont Parade on July 11th. The next parade is the 18th in Welcome.

Faith Formation: Sarah and Jody are finalizing plans for VBS. They are making plans for a group of counselors from Green Lake to come to Waverly. The preliminary plans are VBS on a Saturday with a camp-out overnight. Invitations will be extended to all children of Circle of Faith member churches. Each student will be encouraged to bring a friend. Cost will be approximately \$500 for 35 youth. The cost will be adjusted if more than 35 students attend.

Parades in our Circle of Faith communities are scheduled for July. Jack will report to the congregation the number and sizes of shirts we have available. We will need both riders and walkers. Trimont's parade is scheduled for July 11 and Welcome's parade is scheduled for July 18. Freeze pops will be donated.

Upcoming Events:

Next Waverly Council meeting is scheduled for July 12 after the worship service.


The Circle of Faith picnic will be July 26th in the park in Ceylon. If it rains the picnic will move to St. Peter Lutheran Church.






- Place one or two activated glow sticks in each bottle. Fill bottles with water and decorate with star stickers, if desired. Screw on lids.
- Put some glow sticks inside the hamster ball. Screw the halves together, and secure sides and lid with tape.
- Challenge someone to a game of bowling. For the best glowing effect, play after dark.

Since school will be starting up in a month, I decided to research once again a hymn written by a teenager! William Ralph Featherston was 16 years old when he wrote "My Jesus I Love Thee, I

Know Thou Art Mine." In researching this hymn again I discovered some more information to pass along to you. Do you know that since the very beginning of civilization young people have been criticized and worried about? Martin Luther thought they were dissolute and disorderly; Plato thought they were rebellious and irresponsible; Socrates thought they were disrespectful, had bad manners and contempt for authority. Inscribed on a 6000 year old Egyptian tomb: "Young people no longer respect their parents, are rude, impatient and inhabit taverns." But we must remember that God always has a rich handful of teenage heroes ready to change the world. There was Joseph the Dreamer, Daniel in Babylon, young David, the Virgin Mary. Isaac Watts was writing hymns at age 19. John Milton wrote poetry at 15 years old. Cassie Bernall (age 17) took a bullet for her faith during the Columbine tragedy. We read and hear of young heroes every day.

A Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Michigan related this story at a huge gathering in St. Louis: "A young and very talented actress was walking along the street of a large city and saw a sick, pale girl lying on a couch within the open door of a beautiful dwelling. She walked through the door hoping that she might be able to cheer up the young invalid. The sick girl was a devout Christian and her words, patience and spirit so inspired the young actress that she became a devout Christian and began to doubt whether she could serve God and still remain in the theater. When she told her father, who was also the manager of the theater group, he was dismayed and tried his best to convince her to stay on with their stage commitment scheduled to open soon. She was the star and favorite of the group. He told her they would probably lose their livelihood if she left. She finally agreed to stay on, and on opening night the curtain rose, she stepped forward in the spotlight and in the silence she sang, "My Jesus, I love Thee, I know Thou art mine, for Thee all the follies of sin I resign; My gracious Redeemer, my Saviour art Thou; If ever I loved Thee, my Jesus, 'tis now''. She had conquered, leaving the audience in tears, and never appeared again. Her father was converted and they led many to God with their evangelistic labors." A young actress, singing words written by a teenager witnessed to thousands – God ¹⁶ has plans for us all!!
