PASTOR ANTHONY'S RIPPLES

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Well, the 40 days of Lent have begun. But what does the season of Lent even mean? When you hear that we are now in the season of Lent, do you think, "Oh, now I have church twice a week"? Or, "There's food at church every Wednesday night in Lent." Or I bet most of you are thinking the same thing I am, "After Lent comes Easter, which means that spring will soon be here!" All of these are true statements, but the main focus in Lent is on our glory of God, and our need of all of our sins.

"Prayer is an important for repentance and God's forgiveness of all of our sins."

The number 40 is an important number throughout the Bible. The rains fell on the ark for 40 days. The Israelites wandered in the wilderness for 40 years. Moses was with God on Mount Sinai for 40 days. God gave Nineveh 40 days to repent. Jesus was tempted by Satan in the wilderness for 40 days. And after the resurrection, Jesus spent 40 days on the earth before his ascension into heaven. You see, 40 is an important number. So for the 40 days of Lent we focus on our sins just as Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness being tempted by the devil. Lent is a good time for all of us to evaluate our spiritual lives and work on strengthening and deepening our relationship with God. During Lent many people give up something, or fast. If that practice helps you grow your spiritual life, then please give something up for Lent, but if fasting is more of a pride thing ("Hey have pity on me, I'm not eating chocolate during Lent."), then you probably shouldn't give something up for Lent.

What if, instead you would focus these 40 days of Lent on strengthening our prayer life? Prayer is an important part of our life in Christ. To learn more about prayer, you can read my Ash Wednesday sermon at www.therestfortheweary.wordpress.com. Prayer is our way to communicate with God. If we aren't praying, we aren't communicating with God. Going all the way back to the Early Church, the very first Christians "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." (Acts 2:42) "The prayers" most likely means a form of memorized prayers, like how today most of us have the Lord's Prayer memorized.

Prayer is an important practice and disciple for all of us to focus on. So whether you are giving something up for Lent or not, how about spending a little more time each day in prayer. You can always pray the Lord's Prayer if you don't know what to pray for. Otherwise an easy way to remember how to pray is by using your hand. Each finger represents people to pray for.

Thumb: Pray for those who are closest to you, your family and friends.

Index Finger: Pray for those who teach you, instruct you, and heal you.

Middle/Tallest Finger: Pray for our leaders, those who govern, and those who have authority.

Ring Finger: Pray for the weak, sick, and those plagued with problems.

Smallest Finger: Pray for yourself and the needs that you have.

PASTOR ERIC'S RIPPLES

When Jesus began to teach the disciples how to pray he told them not to heap up empty phrases and use lots of words because God their father knows what they need. Then he taught them what we now call the 'Lord's Prayer'.

The phrases are short and simple. They are utilitarian. This prayer is not a fancy sports car or a large RV, it is a pickup. It gets you where you need to go with the stuff you need to take with you.

The first half is about God...God is our Dad, God is not just in this world, God is holy (different) and we ask that God's world and will may be done in and around us. The second half is about us, our daily need for bread, our need for forgiveness, our need to forgive, our need to be helped in times of temptation and when evil is near.

It is interesting that the first in the list of our needs is, "Give us today our daily bread". It is about the mundane everyday needs of our bodies. Martin Luther explains that daily bread means everything we need for this life such as food, clothing, home, property, work, income, a devoted family, orderly community, good government, favorable weather, peace, health, a good name, and true friends and neighbors. This is almost like the hinge between the two subjects of the prayer, the hinge between God and us.

I think it is at the center because when we pray for these things, we think about those who don't have them. I think it is at the center because we learn that they are gifts from God. I think it is in the center because we learn to trust God as we receive these things. I think it is at the center because through these gifts we learn to be thankful to God and our neighbors. And that is the hinge between us and God...trust, thanksgiving and care for others.

This service is being planned and led by various members of all three Circle of Faith congregations as well as the two Partners in Ministry congregations in Trimont (First Lutheran and United Methodist). The event will be followed by a festive champagne reception.

Parish Council Meeting Minutes February 10, 2015

Meeting was called to order at Trinity Lutheran at 6:05 pm by President Steve Williamson. Other members present: Merle Burmeister, Marilyn Cheever, Karen Helvig, Deb Phillip, Kirsten Rabbe, Jon Saxen. Staff present: Pastor Anthony Christoffels. Congregational Presidents present: Henri Borchardt, Susan Krueger (VP of Waverly).

Agenda: Pr. Anthony added one agenda item – Lenten offering. Motion by Jon Saxen, seconded by Marilyn Cheever, to approve the agenda as amended. Motion passed.

Pr. Anthony presented devotions based on Romans 12. One body – many parts, one body in Christ, many gifts. We don't conform to what this world tells us to do. We are to discern God's will for our church, but sometimes it means we need to go against the world. We are all one body, but we each can have one function.

Pastor led Orientation for Parish Council and Congregational President members, ultimately leading to setting goals for the Parish Council for 2015. Ministry Goals: reach out to non-active members, designate and begin a joint Circle of Faith mission project, and experiment with different additional worship times. Administrative Goals: write our Sexual Misconduct policy, write our Funeral Policy, revise the Wedding Policy, create policy in case any other congregation wishes to join Circle of Faith, finish laying the foundation and guiding principals for whom Circle of Faith will become, with an ear to the Holy Spirit's guidance throughout.

We reviewed the Duties of Parish Officers as found in our Parish Agreement, Article IX.4.

Election of Officers

- . President Jon Saxen nominated Steve Williamson. With no further nominations offered, Jon Saxen moved to close nominations and cast unanimous ballot. Karen Helvig seconded. Motion passed.
- . Vice President Kirsten Rabbe nominated Marilyn Cheever. With no further nominations offered, Jon Saxen moved to close nominations and cast unanimous ballot. Merle Burmeister seconded. Motion passed.
- . Treasurer Deb Phillip nominated Jon Saxen. With no further nominations offered, Karen Helvig moved to close nominations and cast unanimous ballot. Merle Burmeister seconded. Motion passed.
- . Secretary Marilyn Cheever nominated Kirsten Rabbe. Jon Saxen moved to close nominations and cast unanimous ballot. Deb Phillip seconded. Motion passed.

President Steve Williamson explained the responsibilities of the two Standing Committees, as listed in our Parish Agreement Bylaws, Section 3.D. Appointed to the Finance Committee: Jon Saxen, Jody Franck, Karen Helvig, Merle Burmeister. Appointed to the Administrative Committee: Marilyn Cheever, Deb Phillip, Steve Williamson, Kirsten Rabbe. Congregational Presidents are not required to serve on a committee.

Kirsten Rabbe presented the Secretary's report for the January 13, 2015 Parish Council meeting. Motion by Jon Saxen, seconded by Merle Burmeister, to approve the Secretary's report as presented. Motion passed.

Jon Saxen presented the January 2015 Operating Statement to the Parish Council. Motion by Kirsten Rabbe, seconded by Karen Helvig, to approve the Treasurer's report as presented. Motion passed.

PASTORS' REPORTS

Pastor Anthony's report

- . February 28th Equipping Congregations Day in Willmar. Let Pr. Anthony know if you can go.
- . February 23-24 Pr. Anthony will be at Continuing Ed will not be in the office.
- Pr. Eric is currently at Continuing Ed in Colorado.
- Pr. Anthony will close the church office on Easter Monday. This will be his policy going forward, as Holy Week is the busiest week of the year on the church calendar for pastoral and office staff.

OLD BUSINESS

Weather Policy

Kirsten Rabbe moved that we strike "If one of the Circle of Faith Parish congregation cancels, all worship services in the parish are cancelled", add "weekday only" after KSUM, and move KSUM to the end of the radio list. This will allow weather related cancellations to be made by the congregational presidents, after consultation with the Lead Pastor. Seconded by Jon Saxen. Communications team will check on the viability of radio stations, if they are available to make current announcements on Sunday mornings, and look into alternate methods to contact members in case of cancellations (phone trees, etc.)

Insurance Update

Steve Williamson reported that the premium for liability insurance approved at the January meeting will be less than expected. Jay Borchardt came up with a "middle of the road policy", which will cost less initially, and can be reevaluated as we look at all three congregations' policies. Pastor Anthony has received the boilerplate policy from the synod for a parish Sexual Misconduct policy. This will need to be completed as soon as possible, but no later than our renewal date for the policy. This will also have to be referenced in our Employee Handbook.

Proposed technology equipment replacement fund

Steve Williamson presented 2 possible Scenarios for equipment replacement for Circle of Faith computers, copier, and printer. Motion by Jon Saxen, seconded by Karen Helvig to establish a technology equipment fund, setting aside \$2000 from budget surplus from 2014, \$1500 from anticipated 2015 budget surplus, and budget for \$1500 each year in the future, with a cap at \$7500, replenishing at \$1500 per year level as needed when money is disbursed from that fund. . Motion carried.

Proposed Meal Ministry

The Parish Communications Team shared an idea for a joint mission project, offering the gift of frozen, homemade (or purchased) meals in times of need to parish and community members. The Council shared their thoughts on the idea. Each Congregational Council will also be asked for their input at their February meetings, after which the Comm. Team will evaluate moving forward with the project.

NEW BUSINESS

Lenten Offering Designation

St. Peter and Trinity Sunday schools have been actively collecting money for the ELCA Good Gifts Global Barnyard. Pr. Anthony's suggestion for the joint offerings taken during mid-week Lenten Services would be to put them toward that project. Jon Saxen moved that we donate our undesignated joint mid-week Lenten offerings to the ELCA's Good Gifts Global Barnyard, with the money collected at each congregation going towards the respective mission project selected by the Sunday School children at that congregation. Motion passed. Ask Steve who seconded.

The next Circle of Faith Parish Council meeting will be March 10, 2014, 6:00 pm, at Trinity in Welcome. Motion by Jon Saxen, seconded by Deb Phillip, to adjourn the meeting at 9:00 pm. Motion passed.

MARCH 2015 Seminarian's Letter Home

To the membership of Circle of Faith Parish:

Greetings to you all from Evanston, IL! As I write this, it's bitterly cold outside. But spring is on the way. The days are getting longer now, and eventually they will start to warm up. In the meantime, we get to begin planning our gardens, working on machinery to get it ready for planting, and praying for a safe, healthy growing season ahead, hoping that it will come. During Lent, we as a parish are doing a lot of talking about prayer, specifically the Lord's Prayer.

On internship, I remember a vivid moment involving the Lord's Prayer. It was Good Friday, and the congregation's unique custom was to completely darken the entire church late at night, except for one single candle on the altar, as the story of the crucifixion was read from John's Gospel. At the moment of Christ's death in the story, the acolytes slipped up behind the altar to an enormous piece of sheet metal hanging from the ceiling. They then pounded on it with giant hammers to symbolize the earth shaking and heaven rumbling with thunder at that moment. It made a noise like a severe thunderstorm right inside the pitch-black sanctuary – scary stuff! Then the Bible was slammed shut to recall the tomb being sealed with the stone.

At that point, at the end of the liturgy, we were in total darkness and silence. It reminded us that here, at the foot of the cross, we could not celebrate or praise or bless. We could do nothing but pray, and not even in our own words, but in the words that Jesus taught us. As we prayed the Lord's Prayer, the candle was carried to the door to guide people out in silence. Then it was replaced, and left burning on the altar until the Easter Vigil.

It was comforting to know that, even at that darkest and scariest of moments, we could still pray that prayer that Jesus taught us. What's more, it was comforting to know that Christ had promised that this prayer would be heard, and honored, always. Even if we are too small, or too dumbfounded, or too nerve-wracked to understand what we pray, or even if we have prayed it so many times we can do it without thinking, we can still pray this prayer. Even now, in the desert of Lent and before the uncertainty of the future, we can still pray in this manner. And God, whose promise we seek after during this purple time, will answer.

Following Christ through the wilderness of Lent, let us pray for God's blessing, using these words: Bend your ear to our prayers, Lord Christ, and come among us. By your gracious life and death for us, bring light into the darkness of our hearts, and anoint us with your Spirit, for you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen. [ELW, Lent IV]

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.



Waverly Council Meeting February 17, 2015

Council members present: Nancy Nordstrom, Sue Krueger, Don Nordstrom, Karen Koeder, Cliff Armburst, Brad Sherman, Tom Peterson, MarLeone Williamson, Pastor Anthony and Belva Peterson. The meeting was called to order by the President Nancy Nordstrom. Nancy opened the meeting with a devotion and prayer.

<u>The secretary's report</u> from January 13, 2015 was read and approved. A letter of thank you was read from Luther Memorial Home for the \$100 donation from Waverly.

We received a letter from the radio station KJLY asking for a monetary gift from Waverly. The letter was giving to the Caring Ministries Committee to make a recommendation.

<u>Cliff presented the treasurer's report</u>, balance is negative \$11,989.10. He said a lot of bills are paid the first of the year so the next few months hopefully we will be in the positive numbers. Motion to accept the report by Karen and seconded by Sue.

There will be another service this year on the Saturday evening before Easter. We will be in partnership with Circle of Faith churches and 1st Lutheran and Methodist Church in Trimont. Trinity in Welcome will host this service.

- -Pastor gave each member a leadership personality assessment paper. After completing the papers we divided into groups and discussed strengths we each could bring to the council and Waverly.
- -We also discussed our parish mission statement. After reviewing the statement we looked at what we do well at Waverly and what we could improve.



"What Wondrous Love is This" is a beautiful Lenten hymn. It is written in a soft minor key with a beautiful melody. Its beginnings are truly unknown but it has been traced back to the Appalachian area as a spiritual. It was handed down from generation to generation and does have many variations. The hymn first appeared in the early 1800's in a camp meeting song book. It wasn't included in any formal hymnals until the United Methodist Book of Hymns included it in 1966. It now appears in many major hymnals. It simply asks the question, "Why did He do this, for me? Why did He come down to bear the dreadful curse for my soul? Why did He lay aside His crown, for my soul?" The answer is, because of God's Wondrous Love for us! The final two verses declare that we will sing on, while millions join the theme - when from death we are all free – we'll sing on of God's Wondrous Love all through eternity.
